# RUKI FAMÉ-KAMANO MAN

Born in Yohobo village, Eastern Highlands in 1952, sculptor Ruki Famé is arguably Papua New Guinea's most significant living artist. Educated further afield in Finintegu, Kainantu, Asaroka and Mount Hagen, Ruki subsequently found village life too restrictive and left to reside permanantly in Port Moresby in 1968.

Working initially as a labourer with a small manufacturing company, Ruki was later trained as a welder; honing his technical skills in the fabrication of steel office furniture. Soon after, Famé had a short stint working with a *wantok* (literally 'one talk'—a person speaking one's own language<sup>1</sup>) at Hara Hara Prints, one of the few indigenously owned and operated businesses in the country. Here, he met Georgina Beier, an English expatriate artist who went on to mentor almost the entire first generation of PNG contemporary artists. Thinking that Ruki was wasting his time working on an activity for which he was not suited, Georgina encouraged the nineteen year-old to use his existing skills to start his own business as an 'art' welder.

After a short time operating his own business, making steel security shutters, gates and screens, Famé had a brief stint in 1971 at Goroka Teachers College under the tutelage of Scottish artist Tom Craig. This was followed by a five year fellowship, as part of the first intake of promising and established artists, at the newly created National Art School in Port Moresby. Many of these 'fellows' went on to become the acknowledged 'masters' of contemporary PNG art.

Ruki Famé is one of the two great innovators in the history of contemporary PNG art, which flourished around the time of the country's independence in 1975. The other, Mathias Kauage O.B.E., who died in 2003, spawned a multi-generational school of imitators of his unique naïve painting style; many of whom still operate in the country's capital and beyond. A giant of a man, both literally and figuratively, Kauage's colourful and energetic renderings of contemporary urban life depicted the madness of the twentieth century from the viewpoint of a man with prehistoric origins.

Like Kauage's paintings, Famé's quirky figurative sculptures often reflect upon modern urban life. His wry observations of the peculiarities and effects of colonial subordination on a population largely drawn from the country's rural areas are simultaneously hilarious and poignant. A true innovator, Famé's large-scale sculptural commissions are seen on the facades of significant buildings and in prominent public places throughout the country. His style has inspired and influenced well known sculptors, such as Gikman Kundum, Beni More, Tommy Deko and many others.

Now sixty four years of age, Ruki Famé hadn't worked for a decade prior to this year. The sad and pitiable reason is: In a country which is one of the world's largest exporters of natural gas, the artist simply couldn't afford the bottled oxygen and acetylene he required for cutting and welding the steel from

which his sculptures are made. Sadly, in PNG, bottled gas, like so many other commodities, is imported from overseas. This puts it well out of the reach of ordinary people.

Comprising eighteen extraordinary sculptures, the works in this exhibition are constructed from the detritus of modern life: steel from burned-out cars, empty fuel drums and whatever the artist can salvage. The subject matter covers disparate human activity, from customary subjects such as an Assaro mud man, a trio of Tolai Duk-Duk dancers and a highlands warrior holding his dead son, to an enchanting portrayal of modern city life with a man riding a bicycle.

'Sexy lady', depicting a naked woman running with a cup of 'grog' in one hand and her underpants in the other, is the most recent in a long line of Famé's well-known *pamuk* (prostitute) works. This penetrating rendition of modern city life comments upon the demoralizing effects, upon some, of daily existence in a post-colonial world.

At the same time, Famé's observations of bestial life are simultaneously charming and shocking. Comprising superb characterizations of both domestic animals and wildlife, the works include a pair of horses with men, a pig, a tortoise and a *pukpuk kaikai meri* (woman-eating crocodile).

Having exhibited over many decades in Asia, Australia, Canada, England, Europe and PNG, this will be Ruki Famé's first solo exhibition in Australia.
